

Youth Protection Training is required for all adults.

Proof of Youth Protection Training (course certificate) must be submitted with every adult application. You can take the class in person or on-line, and it must be renewed every two years. The pack requests that the parent who is working with their child in scouting take the course.

How to access Youth Protection Training On-line:

- Go to www.myscouting.org
- If you do not already have an account, set one up. Use the name as it appears on your driver's license. You do not need a BSA membership ID to take training courses. You can return later and update your profile to add your membership number once your application has been approved.
- Once you are signed in, from the menu on the left, click **E-Learning**.
- From the **General** tab, scroll down to **Youth Protection Training** and click **Take Course**. The course should take about an hour or less to complete.
- When you complete the course, print two copies of certificate of completion. One copy will go to the pack trainer (Sandy Waid) for pack records. Save a copy of the certificate for your records.
- You can take other Cub Scout training courses under the Cub Scout tab, if desired.
- To log out, click on "**Welcome** (your name)" at top right and you will see the "**log out of the system**" option.
- When your volunteer application is approved, you will receive a BSA membership card, which includes your member ID number. After you receive your membership card, log onto MyScouting, click My Profile, and enter your member ID number. This links your Youth Protection training records, and any other MyScouting training records, to your BSA membership.
